Secretary Beaudreau spent much of his early life in Alaska and is well acquainted with the issues on the ground. He was key to advancing important conservation gains for Alaska's lands and waters during his years at Interior under President Obama, including action toward increasing protections for the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. We look forward to working with him and Secretary Deb Haaland to restore protections for the Arctic Refuge and to ensure the future well-being of all of Alaska's public lands and waters.

"Alaska is experiencing disproportionate climate impacts with rising temperatures, eroding coastlines, disappearing sea ice, increases in wildfires, melting permafrost. These realities are reshaping wild Alaska and directly impacting wildlife and frontline communities, especially Indigenous communities. Tommy Beaudreau comes to Interior as someone who fully understands the climate and biodiversity challenges Alaska is facing and the kind of actions that need to be taken."
